Dear Father, I was wondering... When did the Bible chapters and verses begin? Dear Friend, Thank you for your great question. In 325 AD the Emperor Constantine and the Bishops who assembled for the Council of Nicea, decided which books would be included in the Bible. In 382 AD St Jerome translated the bible into Latin from Greek and Hebrew. In the 13th century Stephen Langton was a scholar and professor at the University of Paris. He is credited with being the first person to divide the Bible into chapters in 1205. He later became the Archbishop of Canterbury. Robert Estienne was a French printer who numbered the verses within each chapter in 1551. He published a greek and latin edition of the New Testament with numbered verses and in 1553 he published the first complete Bible with chapters and verses.

Centuries earlier Jewish scholars divided the Old Testament in verses, but not chapters. The most recent Catholic translation of the Bible occurred in 2019, the St Joseph New Catholic Bible. The New American Bible was published in 2011, and is widely used by English speakers in the United States. The chapters and verses are standard.

Our cemeteries are witnesses to everlasting life. We treat our beloved dead with the greatest respect and love. We recommend having a wake, funeral Mass, and burial when a person dies. Cremains are to be buried in consecrated ground. They are not to be kept on the mantle, or put in jewelry, and they are not to be scattered around. The price of the burial includes perpetual care of the body and of the cemetery grounds.

Burial of the dead is a corporal work of mercy, and praying for the dead is a spiritual work of mercy.

MISSION HELP Father Sebastian, the pastor of St Mary's parish in Claremont, is leading an effort to get new donated clothing and new bedsheets. These items will be shipped to Papua, New Guinea to help with the Mission there, which is led by the local Bishop, who belongs to the Heralds of the Good News order.
